## **Bond Market Review**

August 18, 2025

### Summary

• The Federal Reserve's (Fed) job may face increased challenges following last week's higher than expected July Producer Price Index (PPI) tempered expectations for Fed Funds rate cuts. The July Non-Farm Payrolls report and Consumer Price Index (CPI) report seemed to imply that an easing cycle was imminent, however, the renewed threat of price pressures suggests patience is warranted. The Treasury futures market continues to price in two cuts in 2025 and three in 2026.

### **Corporate Spreads Near 25-Year Lows**

Positive market technicals continue to overwhelm any macro concerns as we are now near 25-year lows in the Bloomberg U.S. Agg Corporate Index as of Friday's close. The weak Non-Farm Payrolls report from two weeks ago seems like a distant memory now. While supply has been elevated over the last two weeks, this seems to have been more than offset by two-consecutive weeks of over \$10B in retail inflows.

### **High Yield Tighter Amid Mixed Data**

The high yield market continued to grind last week with spreads tightening six bps to 289 bps amid mixed economic data. The option-adjusted spread is now 24 bps inside the local high from August 1 which marked the one-day 27 bps widening event following the July payrolls number. Market optimism remains elevated as some investors seem to be looking through incrementally hotter inflation data and expecting the Fed to commence rate cuts again in September. Healthcare and Food & Beverage outperformed this week while Paper & Packaging was the only sector to post negative total returns.

### **Munis Ignored Treasury Weakness**

• The municipal market outperformed Treasuries as tax-exempt yields declined across the curve while Treasury yields rose. Volatility was limited and the pace of activity slowed from the previous few weeks' strong pace of new issuance. This could be due to thinly staffed trading desks or simply apathy from the compressed valuations, but the end result was positive in our view. The new issue calendar slows to \$7.5B this week, or 84% of the 5-year average, as we passed the inflection point for the positive summer technical period.

#### **Healthcare Sector Positive in June**

The healthcare sector may face approaching headwinds with enacted cuts to Medicare and Medicaid, but the coming stress is not showing up in the data yet, at least in aggregate. The latest Kaufman Hall Hospital Flash report indicates hospital operating margins improved in June to 6.6%, up from 6.0% in May. Revenues rose 7% year-to-date, outpacing the 6% growth in total expenditures. Expenditure growth has been mostly driven by non-labor expenses in recent months.

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Technical Terms: Duration: a tool used in assessing the price volatility of a fixed-income security. Gross Domestic Product (GDP) A comprehensive measure of U.S. economic activity. GDP measures the value of the final goods and services produced in the United States (without double counting the intermediate goods and services used up to produce them). The federal funds rate is the interest rate at which depository institutions (mainly banks) lend reserve balances to other depository institutions overnight on an uncollateralized basis. In simpler terms, it's the rate banks charge each other for short-term loans to meet their reserve requirements. Municipal/Treasury Ratio: a comparison of the current yield of municipal bonds to U.S. Treasuries. Non-farm payroll refers to the number of jobs in the private sector and government agencies. It excludes farm workers, private household employees, proprietors, non-profit employees, and actively serving military. Option-Adjusted Spread (OAS) is the measurement of the spread of a fixed-income security rate and the risk-free rate of return, which is then adjusted to take into account an embedded option. Typically, an analyst uses Treasury yields for the risk-free rate. The spread is added to the fixed-income security price to make the risk-free bond price the same as the bond. Personal consumption expenditures (PCE) is the primary measure of consumer spending on goods and services in the U.S. economy. Tax-Equivalent Spread is the spread needed on a taxable bond to produce the same yield as a municipal bond. Tax-Equivalent Yield: the return that is required on a taxable investment to make it equal to the return on a tax-exempt investment. Yield Spread: the difference between the quoted rates of return between two different investment vehicles; also called the credit spread. Yield-To-Worst: Is a measure of the lowest possible yield that can be received on a bond that fully operates within the terms of its contract without defaulting. It is a type of yield that is referenced when a bond has provisions that would allow the issuer to close it out before it matures. The Federal Open Market Committee (FOMC) is a key part of the Federal Reserve System, responsible for setting the nation's monetary policy. The Kaufman Hall National Hospital Flash Report is a monthly publication that provides a snapshot of the financial health of the U.S. hospital industry.
